



Sunday morning the seniors entered the auditorium for the last time as students of DAA. Following the Class President's Address by Alea Juhl, and the Commencement Address by Derek Timms, former Bible teacher and chaplain, the seniors were recognized and awarded scholarships from four Adventist Universities (Union College-Lincoln, NE, Andrews University-Berrien Springs, MI, Southern Adventist University-Collegedale, TN, and Burman University-Alberta, Canada) and one state university (Northern State-Aberdeen, SD). Every one of our seniors received at least one scholarship with many of them receiving three or more. Total scholarships awarded was over \$927,000. In addition, four of our seniors were recognized by the Bismarck Tribune and KFYR as "Best of Class" and were treated to a special luncheon earlier in May.

There was not much of a wait that day. Mary Smith was eager to be going. She was waiting at the door. Of course, I still had to go to the door to bring her to the car. Her eyesight was very limited. On the way to Oral she was talkative. Mary was really looking forward to visiting with her friend, Thelma Dean. They had known each other for many years. Many years is an understatement. Thelma was a hundred years old and Mary was ninety-eight. They had known each other for a good share of those years.

Thelma was living with her daughter, Violet, and her husband. We parked at the bottom of the hill. I guided Mary through the gate and up the walk to the front door. Watching Mary and Thelma greet each other was a special experience. Both of them smiled broadly and gave each other a



hug. Communication was interesting: neither of them could see well and Thelma couldn't hear well either. Sometimes Violet or I would have to repeat Mary's words loudly in Thelma's ear. There were greetings and inquiries as to each other's welfare. Thelma told of surviving two fractured hips, recently. She could



make a funny story even out of fractured hips. She told how she had gotten home from the hospital after the first one. She was getting something out of the refrigerator when the

refrigerator door came around and "bonked" her and broke the other hip. They discussed other things, I do not remember what all. They were both looking forward to the second coming of Jesus. When the time comes, that kind of conversation makes the funeral easy to preach. It was a precious time.

The time did come for both of them. Last October 28, Mary died at age 101. On Mother's day, this year, Thelma died at age 103. Both of them rest peacefully in the southern Black Hills, awaiting their Lord's return. The memory of each of them is very special. The memory of the two of them together, well, it will always have a special place in my memory.
