

## **Nothing to Fear**

This is the thirteenth installment of a multi-part series taken from Bob DuPuy's book, *Nothing to Fear:* The Story of Seventh-day Adventism in the Dakotas, published in 1983.

#### **CHAPTER 5: The Work is Onward - Part 3**

By the end of 1891 Andrew Mead had taken charge of the North Dakota Mission. After getting settled, Mead embarked on a visitation program among the churches and isolated groups of believers. He mentions visiting believers at Hankinson (Richland County), Stiles, Forman, Milnor (Sargent County), and Lisbon (30). With the exception of Lisbon, it is doubtful that these were organized churches; more likely, they were small groups of church members not yet ready for organization (31).

At a general meeting in Fargo, July 8-11, 1892, according to Minnesota Conference President A.J. Breed, "Steps were taken to build a house of worship" in Fargo (32).

Through the years a friendly controversy has raged over who built the first Seventh-day Adventist church in North Dakota, Fargo or Manfred (Fessenden).

Since Elder Breed's comment probably antedates the beginning of the Manfred church, the documentary evidence would seem to be on the side of Fargo. Recollections of Fargo church members corroborate the 1892 starting date, and the fact that Elder Meade, on his travels among the churches and scattered believers solicited funds for the building of the headquarters church.

But in the May 12, 1896, *Review*, J.F. Gravelle reported that on April 26 in Fargo, "a liberal donation was made to finish the church." How long after this the Fargo church on Fourth Avenue North, between 11th and 12th Streets, was completed or if it was occupied for some time while being completed, as was often the case, we do not know.

A report in the *Northern Union Reaper* of September 2, 1919, telling of plans for a new Fargo church says that the old building served the congregation "for twenty-five years." Although this could be used as a round figure, it

could date the occupancy of the Fargo church to as early as 1894.

The date of the occupancy of the first church at Manfred is similarly difficult to ascertain precisely. The oldest surviving member of the Manfred church (at the time of this writing), Mrs. Alex Miller, remembers being told that the church began to be built in the year of her birth, 1894.

A much later retelling of the history of Manfred, in 1953, gives the year as 1895. If the rest of the information given in this account is accurate, it and other correlating evidence would seem to point to 1895 as the earliest possible date.

The account states that H.F. Graf was sent to the "newly formed community" of Fessenden (or perhaps Manfred) to instruct the settlers in Adventist beliefs.

Both Manfred and Fessenden townsites were platted in 1893, the year the Soo Line railroad reached the area. Fessenden's post office was established November 23, 1893 and Manfred's May 3, 1894.

The first fruits of Graf's labor were "twenty adults and their families." These in turn witnessed to others until the group had grown so large that there was not a home big enough in which to meet for services. At this point, a site five miles south of Manfred was donated by charter member John Schmidt, and the mud-brick church was constructed.

If Graf came early in 1893 and all the following events transpired rapidly, it is theoretically possible that the church construction could have begun in the spring of 1894 (Mrs. Alex Miller's recollection), but it hardly seems likely. With Graf arriving in 1893, a church organization of 1894 and a construction date of 1895 seems more plausible and is supported by a still later history of the church prepared for rededicatory services in 1958.

A family Bible in the possession of Willie Patzer of Harvey whose family record page was based on the recollection of his mother, Marie Schmidt Patzer, indicates that her wedding, on May 18, 1897, to Michael Patzer was the first wedding in the mud-brick church at Manfred which, according to Mrs. Patzer, was built in 1895.

Since the documentary evidence is divided and inconclusive, it appears that in this instance, the historian must defer to the diplomat and observe that it is too close to call, that the first Seventh-day Adventist churches built in North Dakota were at Fargo and Manfred (33).

We do have, however, a most thorough description of that first Manfred church based on the reminiscences of Mrs. Alex Miller:

"It was built of mud bricks. To make these bricks they used gumbo (clay) soil mixed with straw and hay to hold it together, poured into ten-inch by six-inch forms, about six inches high. (The bricks) were left standing in these forms to harden enough to handle and to hold their shape, then turned over and taken out, laid side by side in the sun and wind to dry.

"To build, these blocks were used like brick blocks, but instead of putting cement in between, they would mix... soil until smooth to hold these bricks together.

"The roof and gables were of lumber and the roof was shingled.

"The outside was whitewashed, bluing was added to give it a... fancy look. After a heavy rain it would wash off, so another coat was applied. The same was done to the inside. The floor was of six-inch-wide boards painted (with) orange floor paint. The pews and pulpit were painted the same. Kerosene lamps were hung on the walls to provide light for the worshippers. Philip Kunz did most of the carpentering. He was very good considering."


