

Nothing to Fear

This is the 40th installment of a multi-part series taken from Bob DuPuy's book, *Nothing to Fear: The Story of Seventh-day Adventism in the Dakotas*, published in 1983.

CHAPTER 9: Hastening the Coming of the Lord - Part 7

Partially as an outgrowth of the Russians' thirst for education, an evangelistic approach was developed about 1917 and continued through the 1920's, that has, in only slightly different form become an effective evangelistic tool of the Adventist Church in the Far East and elsewhere. Throughout the Russian settlements, brief summer schools were conducted, usually by students of Sheyenne River Academy's Russian Department, in which were taught Bible and the basics of reading and writing the Russian language.

The summer schools were also a haven for the children of Russian Adventists who had often suffered ridicule from other children at public schools, who would mock them for their Sabbath-keeping and try to force them to eat pieces of ham. Here they learned Bible stories from Christian teachers who taught them in their native tongue.

In 1924, Conference President Henry Meyer credited the Russian summer schools with a major role in the conversion and baptism of about thirty-five Russian young people.³⁸

During summer vacations and weekends, S.G. Burley worked with J.A. Litwinenco, visiting and strengthening the existing churches and doing evangelistic work in new areas. In the summer of 1911, they traveled west of the Missouri to work among the members of a Russian settlement, probably at Fayette, (Dunn County) where a Russian Sabbath School was established by the end of the year.³⁹

With good pastoral care from both Russian and German ministers the six Russian churches

(Dogden, Williston, Max, Butte, Kief, and Greatstone) became strong and stable, and increased steadily in numbers year by year.⁴⁰

Recognizing the growing impact of the Russian work, the conference purchased a new tent in 1911 to be used as the Russian assembly tent at camp meetings.⁴¹

At the 1913 camp meeting at Bismarck, Litwinenco and Burley were ordained to the gospel ministry. 42

During the next year, further work was done at Fayette, and Burley began to work at Makoti, (southwestern Ward County) when he received an urgent call to come to Yale, Virginia.⁴³

A year earlier, according to Louis Halswick's account, two Adventist families had moved from North Dakota to Yale, (M.S. Krietzky recollects that they were the John Oleinicks and the Mina Panasuks) to bring the Adventist message to this new Russian Baptist settlement. Together with the Delenko family who had already begun Sabbath-keeping, these families organized a small church of eight members that met in the Delenko home.

The new church requested the services of S.G. Burley to hold an evangelistic series in a tent pitched in an oak grove. At first only a few attended, but soon the interest grew until the whole Baptist church membership was attending every night.

When unique Adventist doctrines were presented, many were convinced that they were true. At a Sunday service at the Baptist church the entire congregation decided to accept the teachings and to go to the tent that night to make their decision known. When Burley asked, at the close of his sermon how many would plan to unite with the Seventh-day Adventist Church, the whole congregation stood up.⁴⁴

The ownership of the church building was transferred and the church became a Seventh-day Adventist church. Since there were a large number of children in the church, a school was established and in 1916, the first North Dakotan to graduate from the Russian Department at Shevenne River Academy, M.S. Kreitzky, was called to be its teacher.⁴⁵

The work at Makoti, which had been interrupted by Burley's visit to Yale, was continued by his assistant in the Russian Department, N.J. Michalenko, and by S.M. Harkov in 1915, with help at the start from Burley. The outcome of these evangelistic meetings is not known but by the following year we have a reference to a "little group" organized by Burley at Makoti, consisting of former members of the Max church.


Occasionally Makoti is referred to as a church in the records of the time, but the weight of evidence seems to suggest that it was only a company at best, perhaps, only a Sabbath School.⁴⁶

Like many sheep ranchers in the West, Lexy Fowler has tried just about everything to stop crafty coyotes from killing her sheep. She has used odor sprays, electric fences, and "scare-coyotes." She has slept with her lambs during the summer and has placed battery-operated radios near them. She has corralled them at night and herded them during the day.

But the southern Montana rancher has lost scores of lambs--fifty last year alone.

Then she discovered the llama--the aggressive, funny-looking, afraid-of-nothing llama. Fowler said, "Llamas don't appear to be afraid of anything. When they see something, they put their head up and walk straight toward it. That is aggressive behavior as far as the coyote is concerned, and they won't have anything to do with that. Huron Church Pays Loan in Record Time

In March of 2019, the Huron Adventist Church, in a business meeting led by Pastor Rob Carlson, moved to proceed with a much-needed remodeling of the church and fellowship hall.

The members decided to re-side the Fellowship Hall, replace the doors, and put a new floor in the kitchen. In the church, the carpet was removed from the wall surrounding the mural in the front of the Sanctuary, and sheetrock was installed. A new carpet was installed, front to back including new flooring in the bathrooms, aging windows and doors were replaced, and the entire interior of the church was repainted from ceiling to floor. The decision was made to connect the two buildings by creating a walk-through from the church to the fellowship hall.

Approximately \$78,000 was spent on the entire project. In the loan request, \$55.000 was requested though only \$42,000 was actually borrowed in the fall of 2019. It was a 10-year note at 4 ½% interest and the church members were determined to pay it off as quickly as possible. In May of 2021, it was paid in full with money left over to cover the repair of the kitchen ceiling. The response of the Huron Church Family to pay off the project's loan so quickly is a tribute to the members' dedication and faithfulness to the cause of Christ.

Church members praise God for His goodness in all of the planning and decision-making. There was a wonderful spirit of cooperation and generosity that is so typical of the Huron Adventist Church. The congregation prays for God's blessing and for their church to be a light to the community.



Anchored at Dakota Campmeeting

Campmeeting is a time of fellowship and spiritual growth. This year's event was centered around the theme "Anchored" and was packed with excellent speakers, beautiful music, and good food. Though attendance was less than normal, those present for the meetings appreciated the speakers and the comfort of the "red, cushy chairs" in the auditorium. One attendee admitted, "Every year it seems I drag my feet about going to Campmeeting but once I am there, I am so blessed!"

Dr. John McVay, president of Walla Walla University, was the featured speaker and spoke every evening as well as for church reviewing ideas from the book of *Ephesians*. Dr. Kendra Haloviak Valentine, professor at La Sierra University, shared material on *Revelation* and how to be anchored and unafraid during the judgment. Elder Mike Tucker, a former speaker for Faith for Today, presented seminars from his series, *Mad About Marriage*, and offered attendees new communication tools. Elder Gil Webb, former VP of administration for the Mid-America Union Conference and retired minister, spoke about church health and held a dialogue on some "hot

topics" in the church. Dr. Mark Piotrowski, Dakota Conference VP of administration, closed out the week's seminars and presented on how to live a life anchored in the will of God.

Vitalant Blood Services arrived at the Academy in their bloodmobile early Friday morning to hold a blood drive just outside of the front doors. By the end of the morning, ten units were collected. The organization was pleased with the results and stated that "those ten units could potentially save 30 area patient lives."

On Sabbath afternoon, an anointing was held in the Campmeeting Prayer Room with several in attendance for the intimate service. Following this, the annual "Round Table" forum was held on stage mediated by Dakota Conference President Dr. Mark Weir. Those present could submit questions via paper or text them to the podium. The week's presenters were seated on stage and answered the questions in turn. Immediately following the forum, a private event was held on the banks of the Missouri River where Pastor David Werner had the honor of baptizing two young men from the Bowman Adventist Church with whom he has been studying. Dr. Mark Piotrowski "found the baptismal service a very moving event" and was blessed to witness the men giving their lives to Christ.

After the annual *Hall of Remembrance* on Sabbath evening, a touching slideshow of all of those members who have passed away since the last Campmeeting, Elder Weir spoke on what lies ahead for the Dakota Conference. He continues to believe in a prosperous future for the members of our Conference. Pam Tucker then closed out the week by sharing her music and beautiful voice. "I thought the Round Table responses were spot on," stated one of the pastors, "and I enjoyed Pam's concert." A first-time Campmeeting attendee expressed her appreciation for the event; "Campmeeting was deeply uplifting. The speakers, music, and fellowship provided blessings all week."

Campmeeting 2022 may be over, but attendees are still experiencing the good feelings associated with an inspiring week and many have even walked away with new friends or acquaintances. 
