

## **Nothing to Fear**

This is the 44th installment of a multi-part series taken from Bob DuPuy's book, *Nothing to Fear: The Story of Seventh-day Adventism in the Dakotas*, published in 1983.

### **CHAPTER 10: The School is a Live Question - Part 3**

Working with F.G. Specht, preceptor and head of the school's German Department, Lawrence soon issued a "calendar" for the coming school year as an informational and recruiting tool.<sup>15</sup>

Opening day for the fall term brought twenty students - a number that soon swelled to nearly fifty - to "SRA" to be taught by Lawrence and Specht and by "Professor" Shepherd who taught mathematics, his wife, who taught music, and Gertrude Thompson who served as preceptress and taught English and history. "Sister Wright" served as matron and two students, "Miss Hullet and Miss Knowles", acted as student teachers. <sup>16</sup>

Records of this early school year reveal that in addition to work and study the students participated in missionary activities, organizing themselves into "The Young Men's Christian Training Society" and "The Young Ladies Christian Improvement Band", and sponsored social functions including a "social and musical program" that consisted of "music, readings, recitations, mental drills, and remarks." <sup>17</sup>

Campus physical improvements of this 1906-1907 school year included the

installation of a central heating plant in South Hall, the digging of a well and a cistern for the campus, and, apparently, the construction of another "small cottage" probably for use in housing the now capacity student body.<sup>18</sup>

During the following year construction was begun on the next campus facility, a 24 x 40-foot laundry/workshop with a 20 x 24-foot root cellar. This new building was to serve as an industrial education facility, especially during the winter, for the practice of indoor trades as tent and broom making. Enrollment hit its highest point to date at 57, with 48 students in actual attendance during the 1907-1908 school term.<sup>19</sup>

With even this modest enrollment growth, the academy's meager facilities were taxed to the limit. Three to five girls occupied each room of their dormitory and living areas in general were so crowded that students had to study in the chapel during the evening. The newly constructed laundry/workshop was pressed into service as a boys' dormitory.<sup>20</sup>

Continuity and stability of the student body was another major challenge during the early years of Sheyenne River Academy. The needs of the farm economy frequently shortened a student's education on both ends of the academic year, creating havoc for the teaching plans of academy instructors; 1907-1908's banner enrollment year began with only 15 students and ended with just 25, due largely to farm related late arrivals and early departures.<sup>21</sup>

The often-haphazard nature of frontier education created additional problems for the academy faculty. Although the school apparently offered formal classes from seventh grade through high school, students frequently arrived without even the prerequisite elementary preparation for this broad academic program. Some instructors taught as many as nine classes per day, even working through the afternoon and evening, to bring some measure of uniformity to the diverse student body. Grades five and six were added to the formal academic curriculum during the 1909-1910 school year.<sup>22</sup>

Enrollment continued to grow steadily for most of the next decade with a sustained attendance of approximately 100 during each of several years, and increasingly large numbers of students beginning and ending the full academic year at the school. Enrollment apparently peaked during the 1915-1916 school year at 130 students. Even in 1910, when drought and its related economic conditions generated considerable discussion about whether the academy should be operated at all that year, the school's enrollment, even without the twenty-seven students of the newly

### inaugurated Russian Department, was on a par with the two previous years.<sup>23</sup>





All yarn is graciously donated, with the majority coming from an ask on the local Sioux Falls "Pay it Forward" Facebook Group. Once community members were aware of this ministry, they generously contributed yarn that comes like "heavenly manna".

Our plans are to continue this ministry as long as the yarn is provided and there is a community need. We began as novices with much patience from the Lord and are now masters of loom knitting. One of our group members has graduated to using a knitting machine that her family gave her for Christmas.

The hats send the message, "Jesus loves you" and leads us to follow Matthew 25:35-36. It also keeps our hands, hearts, and minds positively and patiently occupied. We believe we are working hand in hand with Jesus because he taught us to use the looms and bountiful supplies of yarn. Those who give yarn are joyfully blessed as well.


