

Nothing to Fear

This is the 51st installment of a multi-part series taken from Bob DuPuy's book, *Nothing to Fear: The Story of Seventh-day Adventism in the Dakotas*, published in 1983.

Chapter 11: The Good Work - Part 3

The early literature evangelists frequently worked in conjunction with evangelistic crusades, with notable success. The long winters that Tenney had mentioned combined with the availability of Adventist literature not only in English, but in Danish and German as well, (there was apparently a dearth of other reading matter in these languages), created a ready market for the wares of these pioneer "L.E.'s". Also helpful was the booming North Dakota agricultural economy, which enabled the early colporteurs to specialize in the larger, more expensive volumes.¹⁴

During the early years of the church's work in the southern portion of the Dakota territory, most literature ministry was done by lay members of "T and M" societies, and by the itinerant ministers, who routinely sold books and magazine subscriptions during their visits to churches and isolated members, and during their evangelistic crusades. 15

The opening of the work among the German-Russians constitutes a significant bridge to later, organized literature evangelism; the demand for and success of Die Stimme Der Warheit inspired broader involvement and increased activity among early "canvassers." ¹⁶

By 1885, the Dakota Tract Society was recommending that "proper persons devote their whole time to the selling of *Thoughts on Daniel and the Revelation*.¹⁷ The following year, a "company" of canvassers was working at Webster during a tent meeting, and the literature work received emphasis during camp meeting at Vilas, resulting in "quite a number" of new recruits for the "good work".¹⁸

At a "general meeting" in Parker in January, 1887, "the canvassing work received a large share of the attention and thought of the brethren", and it was perhaps at this meeting that J.J. Devereaux was chosen Dakota's first "State Canvassing Agent." By March, Devereaux had conducted Dakota's first colporteur training school at Sioux Falls.¹⁹

In September of the same year, a similar training institute was conducted for North Dakota canvassers in connection with a camp meeting held at Fergus Falls, Minnesota, and by the end of the year, F.A. Lashier had been appointed state canvassing agent for Minnesota and North Dakota and was calling for "persons of good address, of tact, keen foresight and ability", to engage in the literature work.²⁰

During the next two years, Devereaux conducted training schools in various places in South Dakota, establishing groups of canvassers working together in specific territories. Commenting on the "company plan", Clement Eldridge of Battle Creek's Central Publishing Association (*Review and Herald*) noted that the Dakota canvassers "who had been working in companies were of good courage, and enthusiastic in their work, while those who had worked alone" were, generally, discouraged.²¹

In 1889 Devereaux announced plans to conduct training schools in "both the English and the foreign languages" at the upcoming Dakota camp meeting at Madison.²²

The report of the Dakota Tract Society for 1888 noted "the remarkable success" of the canvassing work during the past year, and the society's report at camp meeting the following year credited thirty canvassers with total book sales for the conference of "about \$8.000".²³

After this initial surge of success, little mention is made of literature evangelism in contemporary records for the next several years. In August of 1894, Conference President N.P. Nelson reported that canvassers on the conference's border at Sioux City, Iowa were "having a hard time of it" due to depressed economic conditions.²⁴
