

Nothing to Fear

This is the 66th installment of a multi-part series taken from Bob DuPuy's book, *Nothing to Fear: The Story of Seventh-day Adventism in the Dakotas,* published in 1983.

Chapter 12: The Lord Gave Freedom - Part 11

Religious liberty became an increasingly important topic of concern as preparations for North Dakota's planned constitutional convention raised many questions about the status and enforcement of the state's largely dormant Sunday closing laws. In Grand Forks N.M. Jorgensen's presentation to the city council was instrumental in the defeat of that city's renewed enforcement plans. Church members sponsored subscriptions to *The Protestant Magazine* and to *Liberty* magazine and viewed with satisfaction the failure of Sunday law enforcement endeavors, such as the acquittal of the Ray (Williams County) boys' baseball team, charged with violating the local law by playing ball on Sunday.⁵⁹

And, of course, the conference office was always ready to encourage local lay evangelistic activity to supplement the work of the itinerant evangelists. The columns of the *Northern Union Reaper* and the conference newsletter carried accounts of laymen like "Brother Burgeson" of New Salem, who conducted evangelistic meetings on Sunday in the nearby town of Judson in 1908, or of John Heibert, who placed short doctrinal articles in the *Woodworth Hustler* in 1917, to acquaint readers with the message of Seventh-day Adventists. The conference offered to make similar articles available for use in other local papers.⁶⁰

Another isolated layman who took seriously the repeated calls of the conference for lay evangelism built a foundation for a new church in the far North Central portion of the state. In early 1918, E.J. Klebe, an isolated member from Bottineau (Bottineau County) visited the conference office to ask for a chart and other materials for conducting home Bible studies. By the end of the year Klebe reported that five families had "accepted the truth" and that a company of thirty-five persons was meeting regularly at Bottineau.⁶¹

At the Conference Session of 1913, the delegates voted to move the conference office and Tract Society from Fargo to either Bismarck or Jamestown. A Jamestown site was ultimately selected because of its central location with respect to the population of the state at that time, its proximity to major Adventist centers, and its ready access to railroad lines in all important directions. A new office building was constructed and completed the following year.⁶²

Another major organizational change related to the vital railroad transportation links was the decision, in 1920, to transfer Bowman and Adams counties to South Dakota Conference which could more easily work this area because of its convenient railroad connections with that state's portion of the Milwaukee railroad lines, the two counties were restored to North Dakota in 1928.⁶³

Two final, small footnotes to history must be noted before passing from this time period. The efforts of M.M. Olsen in and around Clifford, and the later 1916 evangelistic efforts of R.T. Nash in the area, combined with the general westerly location of other, related Scandinavian groups in the vicinity, makes quite reasonable a conclusion that at least some of the labors of these evangelists, and some of the believers for whom they ministered, were located across the nearby county line in Steele County. Furthermore, the 1919 visit of E.L. Stewart to a company of believers at Wildrose (on the Williams/Divide County Line) which mentions a meeting at Willow Lake, apparently northeast of town in Divide County, tends to establish the existence of Adventists' work in that county also.⁶⁴

With these two counties, the list is complete. Within the first two decades of the existence of the North Dakota conference, the Adventist message had been preached in each and every of the fifty-three counties of North Dakota.

Postscript to Chapter 12

The author has been unable to locate in his research any complete lists of churches,

companies, Sabbath Schools, etc. prior to 1920, and the records of new churches admitted to the conference and those disbanded are notoriously incomplete. Additionally, the *Reaper* descriptions of various groups as "churches", "schools", "companies" etc. are frequently ambiguous as to whether a general or technical description is intended. While I have attempted to incorporate major developments as accurately as possible in the text, the lists of Sabbath Schools and Churches below (the first such published lists in existence so far as I have been able to determine) from the close of 1920 will be helpful to the reader in taking stock of the status of the Adventist Church in North Dakota at this stage of its history.

Then we who are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air. And thus we shall always be with the Lord. Therefore comfort one another with these words" (1 Thessalonians 4:13-18).



Prairie Voyager Student Baptisms

One of the founding missions of Adventist Education is to foster a connection with God and Jesus. This time period was an opportunity for spiritual growth in the Prairie Voyager classroom. Students diligently prayed for the healing of their friend, Pastor Mike. Miracles happened, and students saw a group of believers from around the world coming together to pray for Pastor Mike. The faith of students and their belief in the power of prayer was strengthened. We are thankful for Mike's progress in recovery and continue to pray for him.



Dakota Youth & Young Adults

My wife, Lynnette, is fearless when it comes to heights. When we were dating, I would watch her walk right next to the edge of tall drop-offs and take a good, long look over the edge. And for the past twenty-two years of marriage, I have continued to watch her do this from a "safe" distance. It is definitely not an activity for me. I have always been scared of heights; I don't even like climbing tall ladders, although I do it when needed. When I was a camper in Ohio, we had a rock wall, and I wouldn't climb it because I was too scared. As I got older, I realized that I couldn't let fear stop me from trying things or getting a job done, and I wished that I would have taken the opportunity and climbed that wall.

One of the activities that has been a staple for years at our Dakota Adventist Camps is rock climbing. So many of the youth throughout our conference have great memories climbing at both Flag Mountain and Northern Lights. Unfortunately, over the past several years, it has become more and more challenging to provide safe rock climbing for our campers. At Northern Lights, the "Pizza Hut" climbing structure has deteriorated, and the holds and the anchor points no longer meet safety standards. Down at Flag Mountain, much of the rock that we have available for climbing is schist, which easily splits and flakes. This doesn't allow for the routes to be well anchored, so they aren't as safe as we would like them to be. These challenges were hard to accept, because as I spoke with kids throughout the Dakotas, one of the main activities they wanted at both camps was climbing. We wanted to find a way to continue this legacy at both camps while ensuring the utmost safety for our campers.

As we explored options and evaluated viable solutions by talking with other camp directors around the division, we kept being directed back to the idea of a mobile rock wall that could be transported and used at both camps while meeting the highest safety standards, allowing multiple campers to climb at the same time, and providing the opportunity for our campers to stretch their limits while conquering their fears.

After getting input from both camp committees and working with our conference administration, we were able to purchase our "Tower of Faith" rock wall and use it during this year's 2023 Summer Camp season—even while we are still in the midst of fundraising for it. And the campers loved it! It was so awesome to see our junior and teen campers pushing their limits and conquering their fears! Our summer's theme, "I Am," focused on understanding how God sees us; in Scripture we are told numerous times how He does not want us to fear. He sees us as victorious. One teen camper shared how she had been terrified of heights but signed up to do the rock wall to conquer her fear. After successfully climbing the wall, she went back to attempt it again. Making another successful climb, she exclaimed, "It didn't feel as high the second time!"

We are so blessed to spend the summer with our Dakota kids as they spend time worshiping their Creator, growing in Christ, and learning about God's plan for their lives. Our Dakota youth definitely have hearts for God, and it is awesome to see them demonstrate their love and kindness for others throughout the summer. A few of our amazing campers even held a bake sale and raised nearly \$300 for the rock wall. Thanks, Layla and Juliet, for your love of our Dakota Adventist Camps and for your hard work in raising money for the Tower of Faith!

We have also received a number of donations for the rock wall. Thank you to those who have already contributed to our fundraiser for the Tower of Faith.

With taxes and shipping the mobile rock wall and accessories cost approximately \$46,000. The Dakota Conference Association paid upfront for the entire amount, so that we could have it to use for the 2023 camp season. They generously decided that the Dakota Camps would only need to raise half of the total cost, and they would pay for the rest. So far, we have been able to raise nearly half of our \$23,000! We hope that you will be inspired by Layla and Juliet and others. We ask you to also consider donating to the rock wall, so we can finish off our remaining amount.

One special memory for me this summer was baptizing Juliet on Sabbath after seeing her climb the wall over and over again all week. The rock wall is more than just an activity at camp; it is part of the ministry that happens each summer at our Dakota Adventist Camps. Thank you to all who help us ensure that every summer is an encounter with Jesus for His kids!
